Brad's Train House

I am sure that many of us as kids had dreams of trains at Christmas time. Some dreamed of a specific car or engine. Others may have dreamed of train sets, perhaps a freight set with cars one could load and unload. Or a passenger set with sleek lighted passenger cars gliding down the track. Dreams that spurred the imagination to visualize their trains on a layout running through tunnels and lots of operating accessories. But how many of us dreamed of a house full of trains? Well, that is a dream that has come true for one of our Ozark Division members.

Dr Brad Marples life with trains started in modest way. The neighbor boys had outgrown their trains and they were given to the Marples family. Several boxes of trains and track were divvied up between he and his brother. Brad got the Marx 1829 engine freight set and his older brother got the Lionel Santa Fe Alco_diesel. The Marples boys played with the trains throughout their adolescent years, but as they aged and went off to college, their interest waned. The predictable result was that their mother gave the trains away. (Years later, Brad would track down his original trains. They were found in a barn in the same box his mother had used to give them away!)

Fast forward 30 years, Brad is married and has kids. The Marples decided that they needed a train under the Christmas tree. Brad bought an UP starter set and ran it on the white carpet under the tree for several months. The simple UP train set ignited the train collecting bug in Brad's brain. Over the next 30 years Brad has accumulated one of the most significant collections of trains I have ever seen .

Brad built a large layout in the basement of his home and filled all the walls with trains. In the last few years Brad has specialized in buying boxed sets and the parts inventories of several dealers and closed hobby shops. The boxes began to pile up in their basement and when they spilled over into their TV viewing area, his wife told Brad that he had to do something.

Doing something involved buying a house in downtown Topeka built in 1907. There were many challenges to prepare the house for storing the trains. The house had previously been occupied by a law firm. The first two floors were offices, but the third floor had a refrigerator filled with liquor and a poker table. All had to be cleared out and the heating and ac units updated. However, the most challenging part of the remodel was getting rid of the hundreds of bats in the attic.

Today, as you enter the house, the front is a large living room/parlor. This room houses a large 15' \times 8' layout with two dog bone loops . One standard gauge and one "O" gauge. Both use 72-inch diameter curves. Brad uses these



loops to test the trains he has repaired. Sprinkled throughout the layout are many classic accessories such as the Ives Station and Lionel 128 terrace. In the center of the layout is MTH's recreation of Cowen's original gondola.





Next to the parlor is the Dining room . The space holds a 4' x 8' Marx layout. Everything on this layout is Marx including the track with plastic roadbed and the transformer. One loop of Marx track has a plastic roadbed. This track is very hard to find. Behind the Marx room is Brad's work area. Filled with test sets and drawer after drawer of parts.

The second floor has 4 bedrooms and the "library" in the back. Each room is dedicated to a specific era and/or manufacturer. Shelving units hold the trains stacked from floor to ceiling. Bedroom #1 holds Postwar Lionel. Bedroom #2 modern Lionel, MTH and Atlas "O". Bedroom #3 Marx and Marx accessories. Bedroom #4 Prewar "O" manufactured by Lionel, Ives and America Flyer. The collections in the library are standard gauge. Manufactures represented are Lionel, Ives and American Flyer.











The third floor (where the attorneys used to play poker) has several shelving units holding parts, broken parts and trains waiting to be inventoried, and a small "U" shaped layout (where the poker table used to be).



I hope you enjoyed our tour of Brad's train house. Many of you are familiar with the collection of the deceased John DeSantis in Pittsburgh PA. Having viewed both, I would call Brad the John DeSantis of Topeka. Here is a <u>link</u> to a video done by the local Topeka TV Station, KSNT.

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A Lifetime Investment in Happiness

Like many of us, I received a train set for Christmas. My first train set was an HO scale western style set that my parents gave me before Christmas to determine if I liked model trains enough to warrant giving me the family Lionel trains the following December. So, on Christmas morning of 1971, I received a Lionel train with track mounted on plywood that could roll under my bed when not in use. My first train set was a mix of my dad's 1949 set and my uncle's 1957 set and was powered with a ZW transformer!

After Christmas, my dad showed me how to make a paper Mache tunnel for the layout. Sometime later, my dad took me to the Train Stop in San Dimas, California, the closest train shop to our home to purchase Life Like trees, street lights that lit up and the Lionel Cross Country set that contained a watchman's shanty, signs, telephone poles and a bridge that I could use on my small layout. We eventually moved from California to Lee's Summit, Missouri in the Kansas City metro area and my dad said that the layout would have a place in the basement and that we would enlarge it to a 4' by 10' layout!

My original layout was incorporated into this new layout that used O-27 track and switches, multiple levels,

and a small yard for switching. I was given the remainder of the family trains that had been in storage and each year I would receive additional train cars at Christmas and sometimes my birthday to expand my fleet. My dad would call Madison Hardware to order parts that were missing from his original trains or trains I had acquired at auctions when needed.

After several years, our family moved to the country outside Greenwood, Missouri and the train layout was dismantled to be moved. The new house had a larger basement where I could build a much bigger layout and planning ensued. The day after Christmas of 1983, my father, grandfather and I began construction of the train layout that I still have to this day. We built the table using lumber left over from the construction of our house and 5 new sheets of plywood I had acquired earlier and the plywood and wiring from my earlier two layouts. I had also received a case of Gargraves track that Christmas and had some old Lionel 022 switches to use in building the layout.

Over the next few decades, the large 8' x 20' layout was moved back to Lee's Summit, Missouri and then a short time later was moved to Town & Country, Missouri in the St. Louis metro area. I would visit the Kirkwood train store and the area train shows to add some key items to the layout during this time.

When I purchased my first home in Prairie Village, Kansas, the layout was taken apart, moved and set up there. My friends and I would have many late night operating and building sessions at this location! Currently the layout is in Overland Park, Kansas, the fifth location since it was originally built and

incorporating parts of my first two layouts that date back to 1971.

Central Missouri Chapter Report


Our monthly meetings continue and are usually the first Wednesday of each month. 2002 Grindstone Parkway, Columbia.
